General Rules

- 1. See page 5 for daily hours of operation.
- 2. The Fair will take reasonable precaution to prevent the theft of articles on the Fairgrounds, but, should theft occur, it will not be responsible.
- 3. All exhibits will be under special charge of Department Superintendent who will enter and display all exhibits and will return articles to exhibitor upon receipt of claim check at the time specified for release of exhibits. Judging will take place as scheduled under each department.
- 4. The right is reserved to place exhibits in their proper class if they have been incorrectly entered.
- 5. Any and all articles obnoxious, or repulsive in character (including nudity) will be forbidden entry, or if entered without being fully known, shall be removed at once.
- 6. Exhibitors must see to the proper delivery of any article and livestock on the grounds, and to the proper care of the latter, as no charge for transportation or drayage will be paid by the Fair. Exhibitors must see to the proper delivery of any article and livestock on the grounds, and to the proper care of the latter, as no charge for transportation or drayage will be paid by the Fair.
- 7. All articles which are the product of the soil must be entered in the name of the producer. Articles showing handiwork or skill must be entered in the name of the one whose skill they exhibit. Such may be individuals, firms, or factories. Failure to comply with this rule will bar the violator from competing for any premiums whatsoever, and render him and his exhibit liable to expulsion from the grounds.
- 8. Exhibitors may make only one entry in each class. **EXCEPTIONS**: See rules governing Livestock, Flower Show and Tobacco Leaf Show.
- 9. All entries shall be for the first premium of the class number under which they are entered; but, failing to take the first, shall compete for the second, if second is offered; but shall not be awarded more than one premium under the same number. Judges' decision is final if all criteria is met. Judging results records will be used to clarify winners, placement of ribbons and premiums paid.
- 10. NO ARTICLE OR ANIMAL WILL BE ENTITLED TO SPACE UNTIL THE PROPER ENTRY HAS BEEN MADE. SPACE IS LIMITED. (All entries will be accepted in order of receipt until all available space is filled. In any case, all entries must be received by the date specified under each department, and when all space is filled, the management reserves the right to refuse entries even if received before the specified date.
- 11. All entries will be numbered and recorded in the book of entry of the proper department. Entry tags will be issued, bearing entry number and exhibitor number tag to be attached to the exhibit and the stub (claim check) retained by the exhibitor and presented on Monday when the exhibit is released. In most departments, entries will be acknowledged by letter, which will include entry tags for each exhibit entered. Be sure to bring these entry tags with your entries and attach by tying or pinning to the article to which it belongs. These claim checks are your proof that you have pre-entered as required, and save time in accepting your entries for exhibit. Do not remove claim check. (Please see rules for each separate department.)
- 12. Exhibits will not be accepted by mail or public transportation unless entry procedures have been followed and specific permission is granted.
- 13. No persons will be allowed to see the entries or have access to the judging results record until after the awards have been made.
- 14. Items must be picked up no later than two weeks after the close of the fair. Any items remaining will be donated or thrown away.
- 15. Should any person misrepresent his exhibit and a premium be awarded for it, such premium may be withheld by the management.
- 16. The management reserves the right to withhold premiums in any case in which it shall appear to them that the regulations have not been complied with, or that fraud has been practiced or attempted. Anyone knowing that fraud has been practiced and wanting to submit complaint should do so in writing no later than 12 o'clock noon, Wednesday, October 11.
- 17. NOTICE the Fair and the City of Winston-Salem will not be responsible for any claims, losses, injuries, or damages done to, occasioned by, or arising from any animal or item

exhibited and the exhibitor shall release, indemnify and hold harmless the Fair and the City of Winston-Salem, its agents, employees, officers and contractors from all claims, losses, injuries and damages including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees.

- 18. No dogs allowed on Fairgrounds except Sheepherding dogs, and assistance animals for the disabled.
- 19. No automobiles or other vehicles (including golf carts) will be allowed to service exhibits, food stands, shows, or concessions during Fair operating hours.
- 20. Parking space does not insure against theft or fire, hence the Fair is not responsible in case of theft or fire
- 21. All persons are requested to stay away from designated danger areas, as the Fair will not be responsible for any accidents.
- 22. Any person or persons obstructing any passage or roadway on the Fairgrounds with automobile or other vehicle shall forthwith remove it or be subject to the penalty of a misdemeanor, and expulsion from the grounds.
- 23. No person will be allowed to distribute advertising or handbills on Fairgrounds or in any of the buildings except advertising, which may be handed out from a rented space occupied by his exhibit and subject to approval of Fair manager. No peddling, hawking, selling or distribution of materials will be allowed except from rented space assigned by Fair manager. 24. No person will be permitted to remain on the grounds overnight, except those granted

- 25. Drunkenness, quarreling or the use of profane or obscene language will not be permitted on the grounds. The Fair reserves the right to expel any objectionable person or persons from the grounds upon the refund of admission price.
- 26. Fireworks, petroleum, gunpowder, or other dangerous or objectionable material will not be allowed on the grounds without permission.
- 27. General illumination for buildings and grounds is provided by the Fair. All connections to main feed lines must be authorized by the management. All exhibitors or concessionaires must have a permit before any electrical connection may be made, and a reasonable charge for these connections will be made.

PREMIUMS AND AWARDS

- 28. A premium ribbon is a badge of merit, and in no case should be attached to an article or animal where meritorious qualities are lacking.
- 29. The following colors will be used to designate awards:



Champion - Royal Purple
Reserve Champion - Lavender
First Premium - Blue
Second Premium - Red
Third Premium - White
Fourth Premium - Pink
Fifth Premium - Yellow
Sixth Premium - Dark Green
Seventh Premium - Light Green
Eighth Premium - Brown
Ninth Premium - Gray
Tenth Premium and above - Light Blue



All Ribbons "if awarded" must be picked up following the fair. No ribbons will be mailed.

- 30. Premiums will be paid only from the judging results records and NOT from the ribbons or tags on exhibits. Payment of Premiums will be paid by check after the Fair. ALL CHECKS ARE VOID 60 DAYS AFTER ISSUE.
- 31. Errors or omissions in premium payments not reported to the Fair Administrative Office by December 31, 2023 will not be paid.
- 32. All entries MUST be made online or post marked by September 1. Any entries made after September 1 will not be accepted. Exception Livestock.



You must include Exhibitors Name, Address, Phone Number & The Last Four (4) Digits of the Social Security Number in order to receive prize money. Entry blanks must be completed online or mailed to the Carolina Classic Fair, PO Box 68, Winston-Salem, NC 27102 or brought to the Fair Office, 421 W. 27th Street, Gate 9 and must be postmarked no later than September 1.







RULES, REGULATIONS AND INFORMATION

1. ENTRIES CLOSE: SEPTEMBER 1. Competition open to the world.

Entry Fees and Tack Stall Fees must accompany entry blank and liability statement signed or entry will not be accepted. Exhibitor must provide the last four (4) digits of the Social Security Number or the entire Federal Tax ID Number for the Farm or premium cannot be paid. Number must correspond to exhibitor's name or farm name or premium check will not be written. Entry blank is located at the back of this catalog. Separate entry blank must be used by each exhibitor for each breed and each show. ENTRY BLANK MUST INCLUDE ALL INFORMATION REQUESTED INCLUDING SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER (PREMIUMS CANNOT BE PAID WITHOUT THIS INFORMATION).

***IMPORTANT - SHOW PROGRAMS ARE PREPARED FROM THIS INFORMATION. ***

2. Tack Stalls: One (1) Tack Stall - FREE to each Beef and Dairy Cattle Exhibitor.

PLEASE READ:

ALL <u>OUT OF STATE</u> LIVESTOCK HEALTH CERTIFICATES MUST BE CHECKED BEFORE UNLOADING ANIMALS FROM TRAILER. <u>NO EXCEPTIONS</u>! FAIR MANAGEMENT RESERVES THE RIGHT TO HAVE VETERINARIAN ON GROUNDS TO CHECK ANIMALS.

- 3. Registration Papers: Registration papers for Cattle, Breeding Sheep and Dairy Goats will be checked. Copies of Registration Papers for each animal must be available during shows. Exhibitors must enter all animals in name or names as shown on Registration Papers except animals being shown by juniors. These should be entered in Exhibitor's name. All exhibitors and their helpers are required to carry Registration Papers for all purebred livestock into the show ring. Animals are subject to tattoo, sketch or mouth checks. Tattoos, firebrand numbers or sketches of animals in group classes will be checked in show ring before placings are recorded. Complete information must be provided on show cards which are furnished by Fair and displayed in all group classes. An exhibitor may show as many animals as he/she has entered in single classes, but may not receive more than two (2) premium monies except where 3 or 4 animals are in one class due to previous combined classes in Beef Cattle. Junior exhibitors showing sheep, beef and dairy are limited to one (1) animal per class. Exhibitors removing animals from show ring after judge begins giving reasons for placings (or any time before this) will forfeit premiums. If only one animal appears in a class, the ribbon (blue, red, etc.) and premium money is to be determined by the judge, according to the quality of the animal shown. Any breed in Jr. Beef Shows with two or less animals checked in. entries will be transferred to Commercial and Other Breed Group. Do not make entries for championships. Only first place winners in their respective classes shall be eligible to compete for championships. Second place winner in class producing champion is eligible to show for Reserve Champion. Animals composing a herd or group need not be named in making an entry, but said herd or group must consist of animals entered in the individual classes, and exhibitor must indicate the class number for which he desires to make an entry. Fair management reserves the right to combine or alter classes that do not meet the minimum requirements of Show. Ex: Only one animal in a class, not enough animals to justify Championship classes, etc.
- 4. **Ownership**: Animals must be the bona fide property of exhibitors, except where otherwise specified. Registration papers or transfer showing ownership must be produced by exhibitor, if requested. In cases of get-of-sire and produce of dam, animals need not be owned by exhibitor except Hereford Show (all animals in the get-of-sire class must be owned by exhibitor or member of the family). Sires and dams in these groups must be named when entry is made. Must have proof of ownership from sale and catalog, if requested. Firms or copartnerships must be in existence thirty (30) days prior to entry closing date. Firms or copartnerships entered into for show purposes will not be recognized, but cattle bred by a member of the firm or company shall be considered as bred by the company. No animals can be entered or shown as purebred unless they have been recorded in the recognized books of record for their respective breed. Animals calved and born in current year will be accepted for showing and premiums paid to exhibitor or farm. For any animal calved or born in current year, and not registered, Fair will accept a copy of application form mailed from Breed Office and stamped that application has been filed and animal will be registered.
- 5. **Delivery of Animals:** Fairgrounds will be ready for delivery of Meat Goats, Market Lambs and Market Swine on **Friday, September 29 at 1:00 pm** (sooner by special request).

In keeping with the basic philosophy of the Purebred Dairy Association, the Carolina Classic Fair supports the Code of Ethics recommended by the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association. A violator may be subject to the disciplinary provision of the bylaws of this association. A copy of the Code can be found in the Dairy Section of the catalog.

6. **Feeding and Bedding:** Fair will furnish, if available, ONE BALE of straw per Dairy animal and ONE BALE of straw per pen for Sheep. Pens for Market Lambs and Market Swine will be bedded with shavings. All stalls in Livestock Barn will be bedded with mulch prior to opening of Fair. If available, additional bedding can be purchased.

Exhibitors will be permitted to bring only a ONE DAY SUPPLY of hay or straw and Fair Management reserves the right to refuse admission of such if, in their judgment, there is an excessive amount. Space in the Livestock Barn is for Exhibition purposes and not for storage of feed. Extra feed may be kept in exhibitor's truck.

7. **Unloading and Loading Animals**: Livestock trailers and vehicles will be permitted in Livestock Barn area only for unloading and loading of animals. Paved roadways around Livestock Barn must be left open at all times due to Fire Lane regulations. NO PARKING WILL BE PERMITTED AROUND LIVESTOCK BARN AFTER 1:00 PM DAILY. NO PARKING IN FRONT OF GATE 10 - FIRE LANE! VEHICLES VIOLATING THESE RULES WILL BE TOWED AT OWNER'S EXPENSE! LIVESTOCK VEHICLES MUST BE PARKED IN LOT BELOW GATE 8 AND SHALL REMAIN PARKED IN THIS AREA UNTIL RELEASE TIME.

Shows for Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, and Meat Goats will be held in the Livestock Barn.

- 8. If an exhibitor is exhibiting at another Fair and cannot leave in time to arrive at the Carolina Classic Fair by the requested time, please make a note on your entry blank or attach a note listing the name and address of the Fair. Exhibitors must arrive at the Carolina Classic Fair within at least 24 hours after the time listed for animals to be in place.
- 9. Fair Management reserves the right to decline any entry and to return any entry fee before Opening Day of the Fair without being liable for compensation. Fair Management assumes no responsibility in any controversy involving irregularities relative to registration or identity other than to make a complete, factual report to the respective breed association on any controversy on irregularities as they may occur.
- 10. Exhibitor must maintain control of animals at all times. The Fair is not responsible, under any circumstances, for animals on exhibition.
- 11. Violators not abiding by these preceding rules and the General Rules may be asked to remove their livestock from the Fairgrounds and will forfeit all entry fees and premium money.
- 12. **Premium Checks:** The Carolina Classic Fair will pay premiums offered. HEALTH CERTIFICATE ARE NOT REQUIRED FOR CATTLE NATIVE TO NORTH CAROLINA

DAIRY CATTLE AND BEEF CATTLE

All **OUT OF STATE** cattle must be accompanied by an official health certificate signed by an accredited Veterinarian or an approved State or Federally employed Veterinarian issued within 60 days of entry. A copy of the approved health certificate should be mailed to the State Veterinarian of North Carolina, Box 26026, Raleigh, NC 27611, at least three weeks prior to Carolina Classic Fair opening date. The health certificate should contain the following:

- 1. Name and address of exhibitor.
- 2. Description of each animal including breed, age, sex, and registration, tattoo, or ear tag numbers
- 3. A statement by the Veterinarian signing the health certificate that the cattle listed are not infected with, or have been recently exposed to, any communicable disease to the best of his knowledge.
- 4. Information relating to brucellosis:
- A. Those cattle which are native to North Carolina need not be tested. (Native meaning those cattle which were born in North Carolina or which have met North Carolina import requirements.)
- B. Cattle originating from any certified brucellosis free herd, regardless of the state of origin, may enter North Carolina, provided that the following information is recorded on the official health certificate:
 - (1) the individual identification of each animal
 - (2) the herd certification number
 - (3) the date of the last herd test
 - (4) a permit when otherwise required in the rule
- C. Cattle imported from a Class Free State shall originate from a herd not under quarantine and need not be tested.
- D. Cattle imported from a Class A State shall originate from a herd not under quarantine and pass a negative official blood test within 60 days of entry into North Carolina. States that are Class A are Georgia, Mississippi, Kentucky, Iowa, Tennessee, Missouri, Alabama, California, South Dakota, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Arkansas and Florida.
- E. Notwithstanding any other provision of this rule, a brucellosis test is not required for steers or spayed females and no test prior to entry into the state is required of:
 - (1) cattle under eight months of age
 - (2) dairy heifers under 20 months of age officially vaccinated against brucellosis;
 - (3) heifers of the beef breed less than 24 months of age and officially vaccinated against brucellosis.
- Information relating to tuberculosis (cattle):
- A. A test for tuberculosis is not required for cattle which are native to North Carolina or for those being imported into North Carolina from other states.

BLOOD TYPING FOR PARENTAGE VERIFICATION. Under the Association Rules each animal for which entry application (registration) is received, may be subject to a blood type test to verify both **ACCURACY OF PARENTAGE AND BLOOD TYPE** as covered under Association Rules Part 3, Section II, Rule 2(F). Staff on the American Angus Association must supervise the collection of blood samples. Animals are often sampled at shows, fairs or events where the American Angus Association contributes premiums or where Association personnel participate.

If a recorded parent is excluded (as a parent) as a result of blood type, the owner may request, at his own expense, the Association to determine the actual parent. Jr. Show Exhibitors: Exhibitors must be six (6) years of age on January 1 of this year and have not reached their 21st birthday on January 1 of this year.

THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION SHOW RING CODES OF ETHICS

The showing of registered dairy cattle is an important part of the promotion, merchandising and breeding program of many breeders. Additionally, it is an important part of the program of the various dairy breed associations to stimulate and sustain interest in breeding registered dairy cattle. This relates to both spectators and exhibitors. In this connection, the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association believes that it is in the best interest of the breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity and to present a wholesome and progressive image of their cattle in the show ring.

PDCA endorses this code of ethics in all breed shows and will give full cooperative support to the judges and the respective national breed associations to keep show procedures within these guidelines. It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the coarse of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. Conversely, the following practices or procedures are considered unacceptable in the showing of cattle:

- (1) Misrepresenting the age and/or milk status of the animal for class in which it is shown.
- (2) Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally, with an irritant or counter-irritant, or other substance to artificially improve the conformation.
- (3) Surgery or insertion of foreign matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
- (4) Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring, or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.

- (5) Challenging, threatening, or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.
- (6) Excessive manipulation of hair.

The following violation is defined as unethical practice that detracts from the show ring and will be given slight to serious discrimination. Exhibitors will be asked to undo or remove the manipulation before they enter the ring or the judge will give the animal discrimination in class by lowering the animal's class rank:

(1) Setting teats or manipulating a teat to alter its normal position such as to unnaturally hold it plumb or to alter its length is an unacceptable practice.

The following minor violations are considered to detract from the image of the show when carried to excess and will be given slight to moderate discrimination by the judge when placing animals:

- (1) Improper fitting practices, such as overfilling and over bagging.
- (2) Use of artificial hair except for false switches.
- (3) Mistreatment of an animal.
- (4) Unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of showmen.

Practices which should be encouraged to enhance the image of the show:

- (1) Establish uniform dress code for exhibitors in the show ring.
- (2) Recognize good herdsmanship and exhibits in the barn. In keeping with the basic philosophy of the PDCA ethics are an individual responsibility of the owner of each animal shown.

Violations of these policies are subject to the disciplinary provisions of the appropriate dairy breed association and/or show management.

REGISTRATION PAPERS MUST BE AVAILABLE AT ALL TIMES.
FOR ANIMALS BORN THIS YEAR, FAIR WILL ACCEPT A COPY OF
APPLICATION FOR REGISTRATION FROM BREED OFFICE.

NOTE: Premiums in cow classes will be increased by 50% for all cows that have a "ME" record of 10% above regional breed average for the state of NC. Two year olds will qualify for this increase if they have a projected "ME" record that meets the requirements. Exhibitors must bring the lifetime form for each cow or the long monthly herd form for the two year olds. Minimum requirements, by Breeds: AYRSHIRE - 18,796; BROWN SWISS - 22,528; GUERNSEY - 17,183; HOLSTEIN - 26,641; JERSEY - 18,119.

Jr. Dairy animals will be shown at the same time as the open show. When the judge completes each class, Junior exhibitors will step forward to receive ribbons, then Open Class exhibitors will step forward to receive ribbons.

JUNIOR EXHIBITOR MUST HAVE FITTED AND CARED FOR THE ANIMAL FOR 60 OR MORE DAYS PRIOR TO THE SHOW. <u>ENTRIES MUST BE MADE ON SEPARATE ENTRY BLANKS FOR EACH EXHIBITOR AND SEPARATE ENTRY BLANK FOR EACH BREED.</u>

DAIRY EXHIBITORS: DUE TO THE POSSIBILITY OF CREATING RESIDUE PROBLEMS FOR CONSUMERS OF MILK OR CHEESE, DAIRY CATTLE THAT HAVE BEEN TREATED WITH PENICILLIN OR OTHER ANTIBIOTICS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO ENTER THE MILKING PARLOR.

Entrance to the barn outside these times will be prohibited.

- 1. Competition open to the World for animals registered or recorded in the American Dairy Goat Association, American Goat Society, or the Canadian Goat Society. **This show is sanctioned by the American Dairy Goat Association for the following breeds:** Nubian, Oberhasli, Saanen, Recorded Grades, Toggenburg, Alpine, LaMancha, **Show order will be as follows: Toggenburg, Recorded Grade, Alpine, LaMancha, Nubian, Oberhasli, and Saanen.** (**The order of show is not subject to change)** All rules that are governed by ADGA shall be followed and enforced. All Livestock Rules and Regulations, pages 32-34, apply to the Dairy Goat Show.
- 2. ENTRIES CLOSE SEPTEMBER 1, NO ENTRIES ACCEPTED ON SHOW DAY.
- 3. Ages of the animals in the Show will be computed from October 8, 2023. Senior does and junior does shown.
- 4. Any questionable health problems will be referred to the Show Committee and/or the State Veterinarian. Animals with obvious abscesses will not be allowed in the barn.
- 5. All entries must comply with both ADGA and Carolina Classic Fair rules. Exhibitor must be thoroughly familiar with both.
- 6. Exhibitors must use official entry form and include the goat's tattoo and registration number. List the class number in which the animal will be shown and indicate any group classes an animal is to enter. In order to be shown in a group class, the doe must have competed in her individual class and the group may not be shown unless all animals are pre-entered in a group class.
- 7. Substitutions of animals will be allowed, limit two (2) per exhibitor.



- 8. A registration paper or a stamped duplicate (as approved by ADGA) is required for each animal. Proof of ownership shall be the name on the registration or recordation certificate. No signed transfers will be accepted.
- 9. No exhibitor may win more than two premium monies in one class.
- 10. Each exhibitor will be limited to one premium payment in each of the group classes.
- 11. HEALTH REGULATIONS: The health regulations of the Veterinary Division of the N.C. Department of Agriculture will be strictly enforced. All **OUT OF STATE** goats must be accompanied by an official health certificate signed by an accredited Veterinarian or an approved State or Federally employed Veterinarian within 60 days of entry. The health certificate should contain the following.
- A. Name and address of exhibitor.
- B. Description of each animal including breed, age and any registration, tattoo or ear tag numbers.
- C. A statement by the veterinarian signing the health certificate that the goats listed are not infected with, or have been recently exposed to, any communicable disease to the best of his/her knowledge. Health papers must be dated within 60 days of the show date. Animals with suspected lumps will not be allowed in the barn, and if detected after penning, the owner will be asked to remove the suspected animal.
- 12. Entry in the Champion Challenge class is open to permanent champions only. Qualification must be by registration/recordation or certification by the American Dairy Goat Association. Champion Challenge competitors shall NOT be foreclosed from group and progeny classes. Shifts from regular classes to Champion Challenge may be made (with proof of qualification) any time before the beginning of judging of breed.
- 13. When completing entry blank, Department letter is E, the class number depends on the Breed and Class the animal is shown in. For example, a 6 year old Saanen would use class number E-2247 under class number on the entry blank. Complete all requested information for each animal on entry blank.
- 14. A separate entry blank must be used for Junior Show and Senior Show (Junior Show is defined as age of the goat, not the exhibitor).
- 15. THE LAST FOUR (4) DIGITS OF THE SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER OR THE ENTIRE FEDERAL TAX ID MUST BE INCLUDED ON ENTRY BLANK IN ORDER TO RECEIVE PREMIUM MONEY.
- 16. DO NOT ENTER CHAMPIONSHIP CLASSES, EXCEPT CHAMPION CHALLENGE.
- 17. If entering more than one breed, please group all animals together by breeds.

HEALTH REGULATIONS (FOR POULTRY ONLY)

All poultry exhibited at the Carolina Classic Fair shall have been in the possession of the exhibitor for sixty days or more prior to the date of the Fair. Exhibitors will fill out the poultry entry blank mailed under separate cover.

All chickens for exhibition at the Fair will originate from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days of admission to the Fair, or the test requirements may be satisfied by a negative test conducted by an official state tester at the time the birds are brought to the Fair. The fee for pullorum-typhoid testing at the Fairgrounds will be ten cents per bird, with a minimum fee of \$1.00 per exhibitor.

No poultry shall have received a live virus vaccine within 30 days prior to entering the Fair. All birds must be identified with tamper-proof bands. Bands placed on birds tested at the Fair-grounds by State testers will satisfy this requirement. Poultry entered at the Fair are subject to examination (including blood test and swabs) by a representative of the N.C. Department of Agriculture. Birds will not be accepted which are infected with, or showing any clinical signs of, an infectious or communicable disease, or are infested with lice and/or mites.

JUDGING

Judging will take place Friday at 11:00 am and Wednesday at 11:00 am. The General Chairman and the Classification Chairmen for each Division are available during Judging for possible consultations. They, along with the Judges and the clerks, are the only personnel allowed on the floor during judging. The show will open to the public during posted fair hours except on Friday, September 29, 11:00 am - 2:00 pm, Tuesday, October 3, 3:00 pm - close and Wednesday, October 4, 11:00 am - 2:00 pm.

PREMIUMS

- 1. PREMIUM CHECKS WILL BE VOID 60 DAYS AFTER ISSUE.
- 2. PREMIUMS WILL BE PAID BY CHECK AFTER FAIR. Only one check will be issued to an exhibitor covering all premiums won by the individual. CHECKS WILL BE ISSUED TO THE GARDEN CLUBS FOR ITS MEMBERS. Federal tax ID number for Garden Club must be included on entry blank. Garden club must include the name of the Garden Club on the entry blank. Other exhibitors must provide the last fsour digits of their Social Security number

GENERAL RULES

- 1. PRE-ENTRY REQUIRED IN ALL CLASSES, CONTAINER GROWN PLANTS, DESIGN, COLLECTION AND ALL CUT HORTICULTURE. Please use General Entry Form. Bring to Home & Garden Building.
- 2. Entries will be received from 8:00 am until 10:00 am on Friday, September 29 and Wednesday, October 4, 2023. The Classification Committee MUST approve ALL exhibits for conformance to the SCHEDULE.
- 3. These flower shows are for AMATEURS ONLY. Classes are not open to commercial growers or professional floral designers ie.... classes are not open to anyone who, at present or in the past, has received his or her livelihood from the growing or designing of classifications listed in this catalog.
- 4. These Flower Shows conform to the standards established by National Garden Clubs (NGC). The NGC Handbook for Flower Shows 2017 and as updated in The National Gardener, are authority for all issues not covered by the Schedule which is the LAW OF THE SHOWS.
- 5. NOTE TO GARDEN CLUB MEMBERS: National Garden Clubs, Inc. permits cash awards to individual garden club members in the Standard Flower Show. If the garden club member wishes the cash premium to be issued personally, he or she must include the last four digits of his or her social security number on the entry form. If no social security number is entered, the premium will be issued to his or her garden club.
- 6. Judging will be conducted by PANELS of three NGC approved Judges and will begin at 11:00 am and end no later than 2:00 pm on Friday, September 29 and Wednesday, October
- 4. The decisions of the judges will be FINAL. Awards may be withheld if not merited. All competitive judging will be based on the (NGC) Standard System of Awarding. Only Judges, Clerks, General Chairman and Classification Chairman will be allowed in the exhibit area during judging. The Classification Chairman for each Division checks exhibits for conformity to the schedule prior to Judging, and will be present during judging. Final determination for conformance is the Judges' responsibility.
- 7. Only one entry may be made in any named class. Exhibits entered in the Friday show may not be re-entered in the Wednesday show.
- 8. There must be an emphasis on fresh plant material. No artificial plant material is allowed in any division.
- 9. Only one member of a family may exhibit in any one class, except Design Classes. THE FAIR RESERVES THE RIGHT TO WITHHOLD ALL PREMIUMS WON IN ANY CLASS BY ANY FAMILY BREAKING THE RULE.

- 1. The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the Handbook for Flower Shows 2017, Chapter
- 7, Exhibiting in the Design Division, NGC Policies and Guidelines.
- 2. PRE-ENTER on Carolina Classic Fair GENERAL entry blank at the back of the catalog. THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT: TO ENSURE YOUR CHOICE OF CLASS AND AN ACKNOWL-EDGMENT, ENTER BEFORE SEPTEMBER 1. If the Designer is unable to fulfill his or her commitment/assignment, it is the responsibility of the designer to provide a substitute and notify the Design Entries Chairman, Kimberly Cruz (336) 575-1869.
- 3. An exhibitor may only enter ONE exhibit per class but may enter more than one class.
- 4. Plant material and non-plant material permitted and not permitted in the Design Division are printed in the <u>Handbook for Flower Shows 2017</u>, Chapter 7. Each design must contain some plant material. Exhibitor need not have grown the plant material used in the design. Rules for design types, advanced design types, table design and table appointments are printed in the Handbook for Flower Shows 2017, Chapter 7.
- 5. All plant material should be listed on a 3" x 5" card (provided by the Committee) by the botanical (if possible) and common names and placed on the provided Stanchion.
- 6. Accessories, bases and/or underlays are allowed in ALL classes.
- 7. There will NOT be accessibility to electricity for a design. Please be aware of this and use appropriate substitutes (i.e. battery-operated lighting). The Exhibitor is required to conform to the stated description and limitations of the Design Type if named in the Class. The Designer is on his/her honor that the Design being entered has not been previously entered or judged in a NGC Standard Flower Show.
- The Designer has the freedom to Choose Traditional or Creative Style with any Design listed unless restricted by the Schedule.
- 9. Please refer to the North Carolina Plant Conservation List and the State and Threatened Plants in the current GCNC Engagement Calendar. <u>The use of artificial flowers, foliage, fruit or vegetables is prohibited in the Design Division</u>.
- 10. Fresh plant material may be stripped, clipped, trimmed, curled, folded, tied or otherwise manipulated. Coloring or treating of fresh plant material is NEVER permitted. However, dried plant material may be colored and/or treated.
- 11. Landscapes or scenes are not permitted in the Design Division.
- 12. Each designer will be given a completed entry card by the Design Entries Committee and is then directed by Placement committee to location. Upon completion of the design, Design Classification checks for conformance to the schedule, allows for necessary adjustments by the designer, then initials entry card when approved.
- 13. Please mark (inconspicuously) your container, base or accessory and DO NOT USE VALUABLE ACCESSORIES. Fair Management, the Flower Show Committees, and the Winston-Salem Judges Council will not be responsible for damage or loss of property, though reasonable care will be taken to protect all materials exhibited.
- 14. Any non-perishable food products are allowed, but must be sealed if the possibility exists for attracting insects or producing undesirable odor.

- 2. Only one member of a family may exhibit only one entry in any one class. (See rules on page 110).
- 3. Pre-entry is required for Horticulture specimens for the Friday and Wednesday Shows. Please enter all categories in which you MAY have specimens. Once entry tags are received, bring only the tags and specimens that you feel are qualified for show(s).(See times and place to bring exhibit listed below.)
- 4. If the exhibit is incorrectly entered, it will not be placed for judging. Subdividing of any class in the Carolina Classic Fair Flower Shows is PROHIBITED.
- 5. All plant material entered in the Horticulture Division must be fresh and grown by the exhibitor. Exception: plants grown from seed, seedling, cuttings or immature transplants, bulbs, corms, tubers and rhizomes. Arboreal specimens must be in the exhibitor's possession for 6 months, and all other entries in possession for 90 days. The rules for a single species cut or container grown specimen are listed in the handbook or its supplement Horticulture Exhibiting and Judging.
- 6. Specimens may not be treated with products that may artificially change the natural color, shine or texture.
- 7. All entries should be labeled with BOTH the common and botanical names (Genus and specific epithet). ONLY PROPERLY NAMED EXHIBITS WILL BE ELIGIBLE FOR TOP AWARDS.
- 8. The Flower Show Committee will furnish clear glass containers on a "First Come, First Serve" basis. From then on, exhibitors will furnish their own containers for all horticulture entries, using clear small size drink bottles for small specimens and clear glass container for collections and larger clear glass specimens. Foil pans may be used for camellias. WEDGING WITH CLEAR PLASTIC WRAP IS PERMITTED.
- 9. Only one specimen plant to a container in all classes except Wax Begonias, Impatiens, Bromeliads, combination plantings or where noted in schedule.
- 10. Clay or plastic containers preferred for container grown plants. (NO CONTAINER OVER 8" IN DIAMETER WILL BE ACCEPTED EXCEPT TRUE FERNS CLASSES I2-57-63 WHICH MAY BE 10". CONTAINERS WILL BE MEASURED FROM INSIDE RIM TO OPPOSITE SIDE INSIDE RIM. Container Grown plants should be no more than 30" in height/width (or discretion of the committee). Sticking is permitted, but should be unobtrusive and not extend above the top of the plant. Please bring only worthy specimens qualified for show due to space issues. 11. Please note Conservation List on Page 111.
- 11. Flease Hole Collsel Valion List on Fage 111.
- 12. Specimens on their own roots WILL NOT be accepted except in container plants.
- Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line (exception gladioli).
- 14. If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foilage plants may flower, but should be exhibited as foilage plants are grown for their leaves.
- 15. Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the "Any Other Worthy Specimen Class."

Double Potting allowed if inconspicuous.
- 4. PLANTS SHOULD BE DISEASE FREE AND INSECT FREE.
- 5. Container-Grown Plants, must be brought to the Home & Garden Building on Thursday, September 28, between the hours of 2:00 pm and 5:00 pm.
- 6. Container-Grown Plants must be picked up Monday, October 9, between 10:00 am and 1:00 pm. Any remaining exhibits after this time will be disposed of by the Committee.





- 3. For Cakes Only 2" slice is required for judging. <u>Must be individually placed on a 6" round styrofoam plate and put in clear plastic quart size bag and labeled with the exhibitors number.</u> DO NOT CUT OFF Display half.
- 4. Entries from same family MUST be from different recipes.
- 5. Due to storage conditions, the Fair cannot accept cakes or icings that need to be refrigerated. DO NOT use pineapple, banana, or fresh coconut in icings (exception of 0058 and 0059). No pies or cheesecake entries are accepted.
- 6. Icings using eggs must be cooked.
- 7. All products that have deteriorated will be discarded at our discretion during the fair.



The uniqueness of this competition gives creditability to the wine industry and it's future.

RULES, REGULATIONS AND INFORMATION

- 1. Competition is open to any commercial vineyard, winery or amateur in GA, NC, SC, TN, VA and WV. Amateur wine makers may only enter categories S1-70 thru S1-88.
- All commercial wines entered must comply with state and federal regulations and standards of quality. Only wine produced and bottled in GA, NC, SC, TN, VA and WV will be accepted.
- 3. Wine can be shipped or brought to the Fair office. Entries will be accepted starting July 1, 2023. Deadline for wine entries is **July 21, 2023**. This is the final deadline and there will be no exceptions.
- 4. Entry Fee: \$15.00 per commercial entry, \$5.00 per amateur entry and must accompany wine being shipped. All entry fees are non-refundable. (CHECKS MUST BE MADE PAYABLE TO CITY OF WINSTON-SALEM)
- 5. Shipping: Please enclose in your shipping box the entry form completed in full and your entry fee in the form of check or money order. Please type or print clearly. Use multiple lines if necessary. Make (2) two copies of the entry form, send original with shipment and retain one copy for your records. When sending one box, mark box 1 of 1. When sending multiple boxes please mark boxes 1 of 5, 2 of 5, etc. Always place your check or money order in Box 1.

 6. Ship wines to this Address ONLY: Carolina Classic Fair, 421 West 27th Street, Winston-Salem, NC 27105. Exhibitor is responsible for all shipping cost of their wines. The Carolina Classic Fair will not accept wine on a C.O.D. basis.
- 7. The wine entry form provided must be filled out in full and signed by the wine maker. Information must be true and correct. Violations will result in disqualification of all awards. Telephone, email, cell and fax numbers must be listed in case Superintendent needs to call. 8. Exhibitors may enter more than one wine per class. An official entry must consist of (2) two bottles of each entry. If bottles are smaller than 750 ml.,(3) three bottles are required. One bottle will be used for judging and the other for display. Wine will be displayed during the entire Fair. 9. 

Do not enter "Judge's Choice" Categories, all first place winners will be considered. All entries must be original and must have been completed after previous year's Fair. Any and all articles obnoxious or repulsive in character (including nudity) will be forbidden entry, or if entered without being fully known, shall be removed at once. Signs or cards on any exhibit designating that products are for sale will not be permitted. Superintendents reserve the right of selection on questions of originality, categories and framing. Judges' decision is final.

- 2. Competition is open to North Carolina and Carroll, Patrick and Grayson Counties in Virginia. There is no entry fee. Exhibitors may make only one entry in a class and exhibits in collection classes cannot compete in individual classes.
- 3. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and must have been completed after October 15 of previous year. No exhibit will be accepted that has been entered in the Fair in previous years. Please give description of unspecified items, i.e., other muffins blueberry, apple, cinnamon, etc.
- 4. Positively NO commercial mixes are to be used in baking and cooking classes.
- 5. Please make entries in proper class. Call fair office if you have questions. If items are entered incorrectly, items will not be judged displayed only!
- 6. The right is reserved to destroy all products that have deteriorated.
- 7. Unless an article is of good quality, no premiums will be awarded. Judging criteria and other special rules concerning different departments can be found on the following pages under department headings. The right is reserved to refuse entry of any exhibit that does not comply with the rules and regulations.
- 8. Entries will be acknowledged by letter from the Fair Office after September 1. This letter will include entry tags for each exhibit entered. Be sure to attach entry tags to upper right hand corner of item (where practical). Use safety pin to attach tag to needlework items, attach entry tag to cardboard for baked goods, and remove string for canned food-replace with rubber band and place around neck of jar. Please do not put tape directly on tag. All accessories must be attached. Do not remove claim check. The tags are proof that you have pre-entered and will save time when checking in.

ECONOMIC ASPECT - Cost of upkeep in relation to value of garment. Value of garment in relation to cost in time and money.

- 1. All baked goods must be placed on a piece of heavy cardboard 6" x 6" which has been covered with foil. A hole must be punched in the cardboard and the entry tag tied through it. Place unwrapped entry in a large clear plastic bag, with entry tag extending outside the bag. PLASTIC WRAP IS NOT ACCEPTABLE.
- 2. Must bring required number of items or entry will be disqualified, i.e. (4) Biscuits, (4) Cupcakes, (6) Candy, etc.
- 3. Exhibits (cakes, breads, cookies, candy, etc.) must be prepared by Exhibitor ONLY.

4. Entries from same families, must be from different recipes.

5. Size limit for Creative Cake Decorating - MUST NOT EXCEED A 12" - MAXIMUM HEIGHT 12" - MAXIMUM LENGTH 12". Cakes will be judged on appearance only. Cakes can be shown on an object - foam rubber dummy, styrofoam cake, etc. If cake is used, judges will not cut. Wilton Enterprises will provide awards for 1st place winner. 



Booth location assignments will be made based on number of spaces available. All entries will be placed in a drawing to determine placement. Once placement is made location assignment will be mailed with Exhibitor's letter after September 1. Entry tag will be given out on day of set-up. Please see the Superintendent or Assistant upon arrival.
- 4. Exhibit booths are 6' wide x 8' deep with 3' high drapery dividers. The back of booth is 8' high drapery and may be decorated as desired. - 1. **Creativity**: Idea clearly defined and shows understanding of purpose and direction. Originality in adapting ideas. Is idea enthusiastically portrayed? Does the exhibitor convey the feeling that he knows what he is trying to say? **Total: 20 Points**
- 2. **Communications to Viewers**: Is it directed to a specific audience? Does it arouse and hold interest? Does it tell a coherent, clear-cut story with a logical sequence of thought? Are title and caption effective in conveying the message? **Total**: **20 Points**
- 3. **Education**: Is there an appeal for behavioral change? Is information accurate and factual? Is exhibit based on appeal to audience and does it tell how their needs can be met? Does exhibit instruct and teach? **Total: 20 Points**
- 4. **Design and Mechanics**: Is there effective use of color, lighting, sound and motion? Are the number of items or materials used appropriate for the exhibit in that they give neither a cluttered nor a bare appearance? Are design, lettering, posters, figures and equipment in a relative proportion to area and shape of booth? Is there a professional-like touch in the effective use of equipment and materials? **Total: 20 Points**
- **5. Youth Participation:** Participation of at least (5) youth in design and set-up is required to be eligible for participation points. **Total: 20 Points**

ECHOES FROM THE PAST - FAIR HISTORY

EARLY HISTORY - 1800's THROUGH 2000's

Long before the towns of Winston and Salem merged, there was a Fair in the area. What is now known as the Carolina Classic Fair began as a wheat exhibition in Salem in 1882. The Piedmont Tobacco Fair started 15 years later, and the two Fairs joined to become the Winston-Salem Fair.

The first Fairs were great attractions. Families traveled by wagons, buggies, bicycles, horseback and by foot. Families took picnic dinners with them, stayed all day and into the night.

The first Fair, which was a Wheat Fair, was held at Pace Warehouse, Saturday, August 26th in 1882. Mr. F. Fries, Mr. H. Fries, Mr. Hinshaw and Mr. Bynum were known to have been the ones who were actually thanked for inaugurating the Wheat Fair. The Fair consisted of 28 Wheat Exhibitors (which received paid premiums), a band, speakers, decorations and agricultural displays.

The second Fair was known as The Wheat and Cattle Fair. It took place on August 30, 1883, at the Pace Warehouse. This was all of the information that was found in reference to the second Fair in Forsyth County.

The Wheat and Cattle Fair was held again in August 1884, this time at the Farmers Warehouse and a second day was added. This year the Fair not only consisted of wheat and cattle exhibitors, it also included horses, hogs, sheep, hay, fruits, farm products, and tobacco. Another change that was made, was that the fair officers, exhibitors and visitors were all charged an entry fee to enter the Fair and any display that was intended to advertise for a business was also charged for their display.

Nothing else was reported about a Fair in Forsyth County until October 21, 1887. It was known as the Fair of the Bashavia Farmers' Club of Vienna Township held at the District School House at Oak Grove. Inside the District School House were displays of tobacco and outside were rows of tables lined with exhibits that were competing for premiums. These exhibits included vegetables, fruits, jellies, bread, cakes, needlework, grain, wheat and oats. The Fair was considered one of the most successful county Fairs of the period.

In August, 1889, the State Fruit Fair was held for two days at the Brown's Warehouse, at the corner of Main and Fifth Streets, where the Reynolds Plaza is now located. Exhibits, which were competing for premiums, consisted of fruits, vegetables, canned fruits and preserves, flowers, wine and cider. Music was provided by the Salem Cornet Band and the Salem Orchestra. The admission fee was 25 cents, which was used to assist in paying the premiums.

The first Forsyth County Fair was held on October 15, 1896, at Oak Grove School House, Vienna Township. This location served the Fair for two years.

In 1897, the Fair in Winston was known as the Winston Tobacco Fair. It was held November 3-5 and it was mentioned that the Farmers' warehouse would be decorated and the county officers decorated the Court House. There was also a flower show held in the new auditorium at the YMCA with prizes offered.

In 1898 the second Tobacco Fair was held November 2-4, this year it was called the Piedmont Tobacco Fair. Brown's warehouse was set apart for the grand exhibits, Farmers and Piedmont for tobacco and Star for the entertainment. The Midway was located on the square between Fourth and Fifth and Church and Railroad Streets. The Fair consisted of numerous attractions and amusements for everyone, they included music, a balloon ascension, bicycle parades and races, horse and livestock parade, horse running and trotting, football from the local University, free concerts, fireworks, and a Tobacco premium sale.

On April 6, 1899, Piedmont Park Company was chartered by the State of North Carolina. The Piedmont Park Company Directors appointed committees for the County Fair, which was held at Piedmont Park.

On October 24-28, 1899, the Winston-Salem Horse Show, Carnival and County Fair was held. There was an admission fee of 25 cents charged to enter the grounds. The entertainment included free wild west exhibitions, war picture shows, wild west museum, merry-go-round, ferris wheel, and a lot more. There were numerous parades, races and exhibits.

The Piedmont Horse Show and Cattle Fair, The County Fair, The Street Fair and Winston's Semi-Centennial Celebration was held October 30 – November 3, 1900 at Piedmont Park, and surrounding areas. Festivities included Horse racing, a Horse Show, Piedmont Live Stock and Poultry Exhibits, trapeze performer, bicycle trick riders, International Shooting tournament and bicycle races. At the Court-House square the band concerts and around the square were business booths. The Fair was labeled as another great success.

The next location of the Fair was on Patterson Avenue near where Woodland Cemetery is now located. Each year the Fair grew bigger and it became necessary to build a new fairground. On May 8, 1908, 28.53 acres of land was purchased. Piedmont Park traded its property, plus 1500 shares of stock for the property. The Fair remained at this location for almost half a century. In late fall of 1908, the Winston-Salem Forsyth County Fair was held at the new Piedmont Park location on Liberty Street.

William N. Reynolds helped the Fair expand rapidly in the '20's and '30's. He loved racing, particularly harness racing and he chose the Fair to close out the season every year. His dedication and promotion developed agriculture and his services to the Fair were invaluable and unexcelled. (His death occurred in 1951 prior to the first Winston-Salem Fair being held on the present Fairgrounds.)

On August 28, 1942, the Board of Directors approved a resolution that gave the net proceeds from the '42 Fair to the American Legion for the benefit of the Army and Navy Emergency Relief Fund, and other war relief purposes.

The Winston-Salem (Fair) Foundation was established by W. N. Reynolds on November 7, 1944 with Wachovia Bank & Trust Company as the Trustee.

Charles H. Babcock appeared before the Fair Board of Directors on November 7, 1949 to offer without cost, land for a new fairgrounds on the property adjoining Cherry Street Extension and facing partly on 30th Street. The very generous offer was accepted. Plans began immediately for construction of buildings and improving the new grounds.

In 1994 Journal reporter Ron Jordan wrote the following:

From as early as the alte 1930s until intergration took effect in 1963, blacks and whites in Winston-Salem attended separate fairs. When the World of Mirth midway show came to the Winston-Salem Fair for a five day run each October, it played to all-white crowds. the few blacks at the fair were a part of the traveling show. "The following week, Lawrence's Greater Shows rolled into and set up on the same grounds, where they provided entertainment for blacks at

at the Western Carolina Colored Fair, the forerunner of the Carolina Colored Fair. In later years, the white fair came to be known as the Dixie Classic Fair. The Carolina Colored Fair, which later became just the Carolina Fair, was formed in 1953 after the Western Carolina Fair dissolved. John H. Marks Shows of Roanoke, VA., provided the midway attractions." While the Western Carolina Fair had promoted agricultural exhibits, the Carolina Fair tried to attract more patrons "by increasing prize money and adding a better carnival to the midway and new features likea Hula-Hoop contest. The Carolina Fair had a successful run from its inception, drawing thousands of patrons from in and around Forsyth County. Promoted as both 'educational and agricultural', it featured prize livestock from several of the surrounding counties as well as arts, crafts and food." In the early years, Jordan wrote, both the white and black fairs were held north of town, and later moved to the fair's current location off University Parkway. "Attendance at the (Carolina Fair) stated slowing down after 1963, when the Dixie Classic Fair was integrated and blacks began attending it," he wrote. The decline of the fair came rather quickly after that. Blacks now had a choice and favored the bigger and better Carolina Classic Fair, and that is where they spent their money. Some remained loyal to the black fair, but also attended the Dixie Classic." Since the Dixie Classic was held first, people often had less money left to spend by the time the Carolina Fair came along. "In 1968, E.E. Hill, the president of the fair coporation, announced the Carolina Fair was closing," Jordan wrote.

In 1950, the name of the Fair was changed to the Fair of Winston-Salem. Then, in 1956, the name was changed to, Dixie Classic Fair for Northwest North Carolina. The Fair has been in its present location since 1951. James A. (Jim) Graham was Fair Manager from 1952 until 1955. He was elected and served as Commissioner of Agriculture, NC, from 1964 until 2000. Neil Bolton was Manager of the Fair from 1956 until his death in 1972 (and Manager of Winston-Salem Memorial Coliseum until 1969). W. B. "Bill" Austin, Jr. was Manager from 1972 until retirement in 1993. David L. Sparks began his career at the Fair in 1988 as Assistant to Fair Director and became Fair Director in 1993. Della Stephens joined the Fair family in 1962 and was promoted to Assistant to Fair Director in 1994 after 32 years of service to the Fair (and Memorial Coliseum from 1962-1969). Della retired on December 31, 2002. Dona Martin was promoted to Assistant to Fair Director in February 2003. David Sparks retired as Fair Director in 2018. Cheryle Hartley was promoted to Fair Director in December 2018. Cary Hester was promoted to Assistant to Fair Director in 2019.

On December 1, 1969, the Winston-Salem Foundation gave the Fairgrounds, Memorial Coliseum and \$75,000 to the City of Winston-Salem. Since then, the Fairgrounds continues to operate under an "enterprise system". The Fair generates sufficient cash to cover all operating expenditures and debt service payments. The mission of the Fairgrounds is to plan, promote and produce the annual Fair to enhance the quality of life for our citizens by providing year-round facilities for agricultural, fraternal, education, social and entertainment activities and events. The Fair continues to develop a long-range capital improvement program that will enhance the quality of service and appearance of the Fairgrounds complex.

The Carolina Classic Fair is the second largest Fair in North Carolina and one of the largest in North America. Recent improvements include a new pedestrian entrance gate off Shorefair Drive (East Gate), a new connector into the midway area, new midway restrooms and a gazebo in the Plaza area of the Fairgrounds. Landscaping efforts continue to enhance the appearance of the Fairgrounds for the enjoyment of Fairgoers as well as the many thousands of people utilizing the facilities during off-season.

In 2019 the City of Winston-Salem changed the name to Carolina Classic Fair. In 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic the Carolina Classic Fair was cancelled and opened "The Drive Thru Presented by Carolina Classic Fair" to provide fair-goers a safe way to enjoy fair food.

Midway


Strates Shows, Inc., owned and operated by the É. James Strates family, has provided the midway, shows, rides and games since October 1964. Prior to this, the World of Mirth, Frank Bergen, provided the midway, until bankruptcy closed the business in October, 1963.

Education Building

The Education Building was built in 1992, heated and air conditioned to accommodate events off season - circus, boat shows, dog shows, company picnics, auctions, training, trade shows, gem shows, antique shows, craft shows, computer shows, and many, many more. During the Fair, the Education Building houses competitive exhibits - arts and crafts, hobbycrafts, photography, collections, clothing, baked goods, food preservation, home furnishings, educational exhibit booths for youth and adults, senior adult exhibits, school art, special children's exhibits, and other educational and cultural exhibits and attractions.

Neil Bolton Home and Garden Building

The beautiful Flower Shows are staged in the Home and Garden Building during the Fair, two standard shows that involve talented Garden Club members and other individual exhibitors. The Home and Garden Building was built in 1997 for the purpose of accommodating events of a smaller scale, i.e., meetings, training by Winston-Salem Police Department, seminars and workshops conducted by Winston-Salem/Forsyth County School System, Garden Council, Winston-Salem Rose Society meetings and workshops, Fair Department meetings and more. The building was named in recognition of Neil Bolton, the Fair Manager from 1956 until his untimely death in 1972. Mr. Bolton is credited with changing the name of the Fair in 1956 to The Carolina Classic Fair of Northwest North Carolina from its previous name of The Winston-Salem Fair. During his tenure, the Fair grew from a local event to a regional Fair. Mr. Bolton oversaw the transition of the Fair from The Winston-Salem Foundation to the City of Winston-Salem in 1969.



Yesterday Village

Yesterday Village is growing in popularity. The village consists of nineteen log structures that were built in the 1800's and includes a one-room church that was reconstructed from logs from East Bend; general store/post office, reconstructed from Easley Road (Stokes County); two story log home from Colonel Joseph Williams, Panther Creek Plantation, Lewisville; one-room school house, first public building in Winston Township (1847), donated by James and Lynne Finney, moved from North Green Street and reconstructed in 1989; a barn and smokehouse (1870), donated by the family of Albert Atwood - Odell and Emily Atwood Cheek of Winston-Salem (also donated a beautiful renovated Carriage that is on display during the Fair in Yesterday Village). Odell Cheek served the Carolina Classic Fair Commission from 1995 until 2000, as Chairman from 1997-2000. Other log structures include a granary (1870) and corn crib (1867) donated by Shugart Enterprises, Grover and Bryan Shugart; another barn that was moved from Hauser Road, Lewisville; the Ed Spaugh Farm Old Store, donated by Sides Mobile Home, Pete, Ralph and Bill Sides, Winston-Salem. Robert and Paul Nickell of Westfield, NC are responsible for restoring and reconstructing many of the log structures in Yesterday Village. Other log structures in the Village include:

Dog Trot Museum (1997)

The Dog Trot Cabin was found in Shelby, NC. The pioneers usually built a one room cabin, then when the family expanded, built another separate one for sleeping and cooking. Large families were the norm, so sleeping space was a prime concern. This style cabin dates from the 1860's in this country. This Museum is dedicated in honor of Della Stephens, Assistant to the Fair Director, for her dedication and the promotion and growth of the Carolina Classic Fair. Restoration by: Distinctive Builders, Inc., and Bill Flynt. Rock Work by: Joey Henson.

Mechum Cabin (1998)

A 180 year old Mechum Cabin was moved from Advance, NC and reconstructed in the Village behind the Church in 1998. The cabin originally had no wooden floor, carpets were woven from old clothes to cover the smoothed dirt. The cabin was contributed by Camilla Vogler of Sanford, NC in memory of John & Mary Mechum, John, Macey, Nancy, Annie, Elmer and in honor of Ruth.

Shropshire Cabin (2003)

The Shropshire Cabin was built in the late 1700's. It was originally used as a country medical clinic by Dr. Shore three to four days per week. Originally, the structure was composed of one room with a loft, or upstairs. The structure was located on an 85 acre tract of land on Shore Road in the Tobaccoville community. This parcel of land was purchased in the 1930's by John Lee Shropshire from two former landowners, Mr. Dula and R. R. Jones. After acquiring the house and land, Mr. Shropshire made a kitchen addition on the back of the house where the two "logged" window openings are located. Later, a two room addition was made on the left of the house. The house was occupied by renters in the 1950's and remained occupied until the 1970's. The building was restored in 2003 and is being used as a village bakery in Yesterday Village. The building is contributed in the memory of John Lee and Bess S. Shropshire by sons, Donald G., John D., and Kent S. Shropshire.

2007 Fair Milestone

The Carolina Classic Fair celebrated its 125th anniversary in 2007 with perfect weather and a new record attendance of 371,219. The new attendance figure elevated the Carolina Classic to the 50th largest Fair in North America.
